Description

We will read Steven Pinker's *Enlightenment Now: The Case for Reason, Science, Humanism, and Progress*. We will discuss reason, science, humanism, and progress. (We will also read individual chapters from other selected works.)

You will submit several writing assignments and hopefully become a stronger writer as you go. Finally, as time permits, we will use class time to discuss strategies for finding success at college.

Expectations

Class attendance is required and active participation is expected. Throughout the quarter you will be given reading assignments. Please complete these before class, and come willing and able to contribute to a discussion. If you cannot meet any of these expectations then please <u>send me an</u> email in advance.

Wednesday Readings, Quizzes, and Presentations

On a typical Wednesday we will discuss two chapters from part II of *Enlightenment Now*. By midnight prior to class: Every student is expected to do the reading and complete a short online assignment. During class there will be a short reading quiz. Finally, each student will do a short presentation about one particular chapter.
